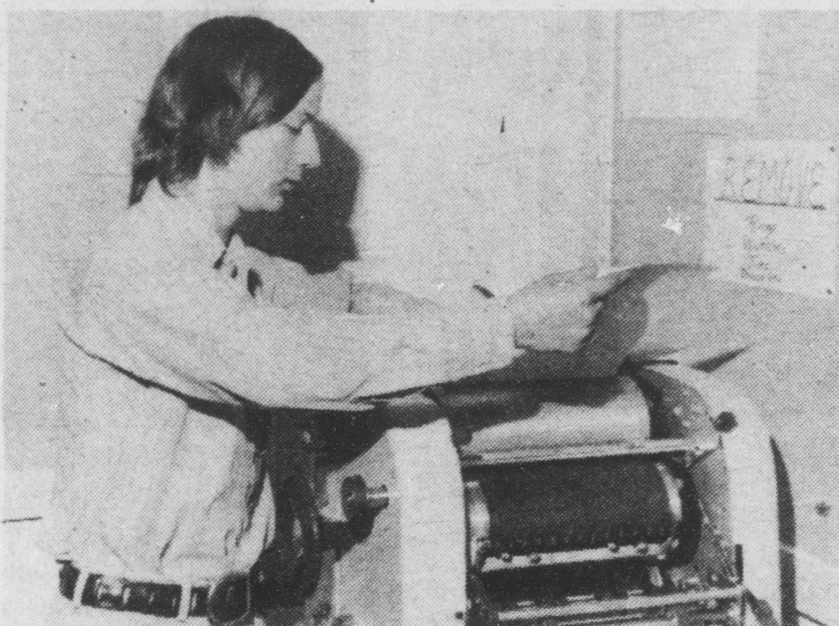


Display latest office machines at D.H.S.

CIVIC (Clerical Individualized Vocational Initiated Course) a new modern course in business at Donegal High School will be on display tomorrow night.

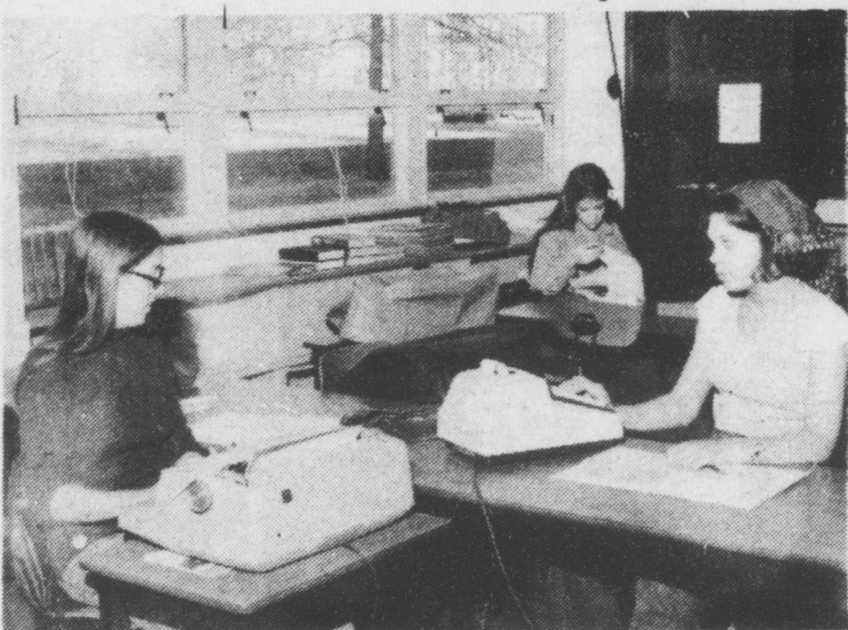
Just initiated this year, the course offers intensive individualized instruction in the latest technical office skills.

CIVIC was planned and designed by Mrs. Naomi Houseal, head of the busi-

ness department, and by Donald W. Drenner, principal at Donegal. Their plan for the program was submitted last spring to the federal government, which granted \$52,000 to put CIVIC into operation.

Desks, chairs, electrical wiring, and supplies for the CIVIC lab were paid for locally.

The program is being conducted by Mrs. Houseal and Mr. Charles Portser of the business department.

Mrs. Houseal and Mr. Portser are now making plans for hooking up the mag typewriter to a time-sharing computer. This hook-up will, in effect, enable the computer to "talk" in type to the students.

Thirty selected students are learning how to operate such sophisticated machines as the A.B. Dick Offset Duplicator, the Ricoh Master Maker (which makes plates for the duplicator), keypunch and verifier (for punching cards), sorter (for classifying cards), copiers, fluid duplicators, mag card console, mag card typewriter (which automatically types letters from pre-typed mag cards), IBM Selectric typewriters, printing calculators, and adding machines.

Instruction is being given by Mrs. Houseal and Mr. Portser, using a clerical laboratory method that is very close to a real-life office. Students trained in the Donegal laboratory will have a technical mastery of the machines qualifying them for employment in an up-to-date office.

Donegal has one of the most sophisticated installations in the state.

The public is invited to see the new laboratory tomorrow night, Thursday, January 16, with the school board, which will tour the lab from 8 to 8:30 p.m.

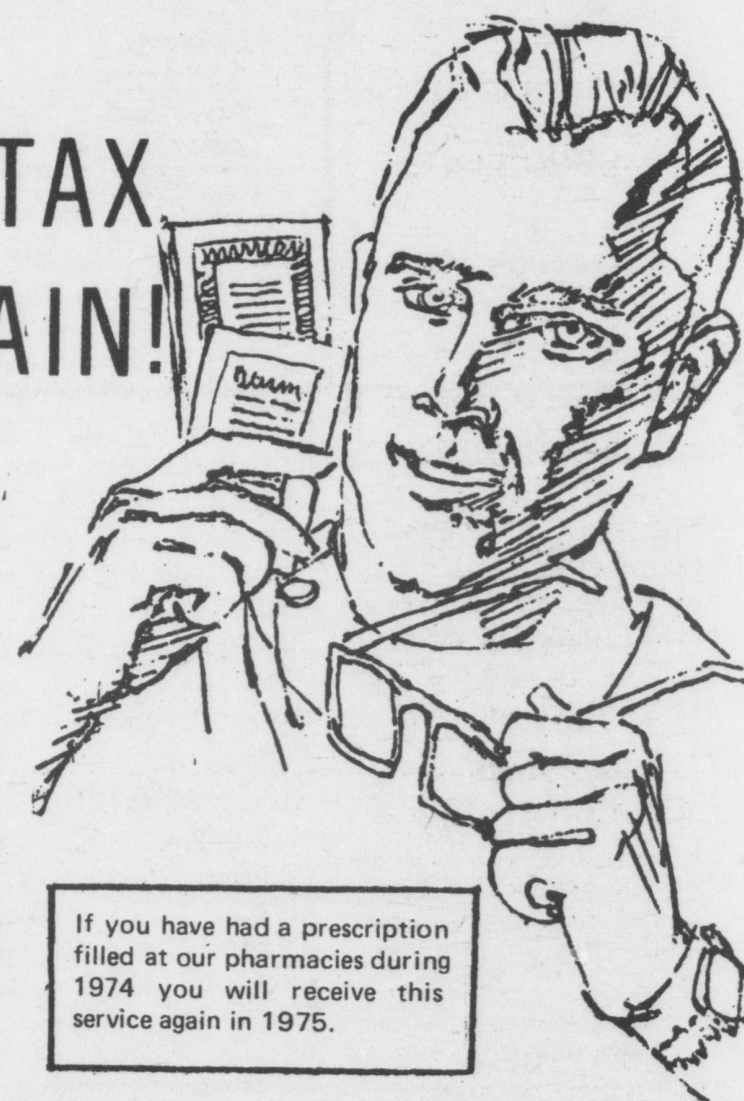

Physical conditioning, discipline and teamwork are emphasized during Marine recruit training.

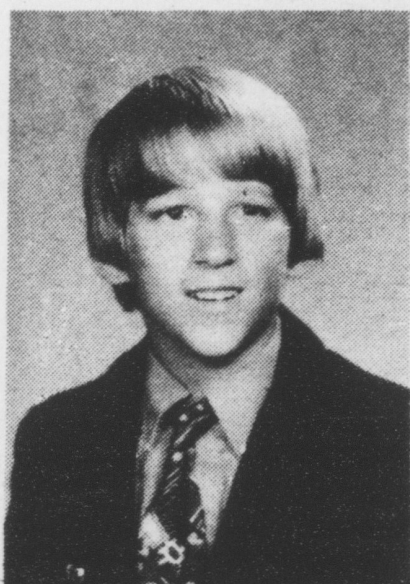
Classes include instruction in close order drill, Marine Corps history, first aid, uniform regulations and military customs and courtesies.

ROBERT W. ENO, III

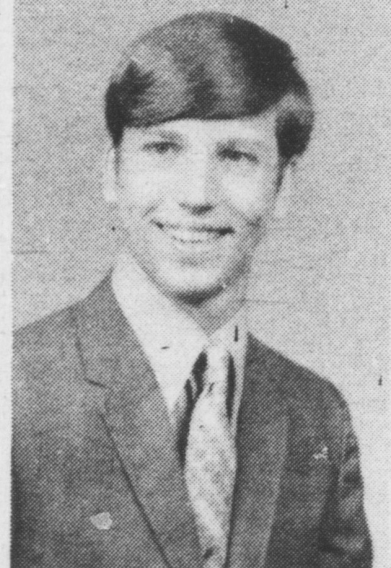
Robert W. Eno, III started Basic Training in the Pennsylvania Air National Guard at Lackland Air Force Base, San Antonio, Texas on January 13.
