

PULMONARY FUNCTION SCREENING TEST

Mrs. Nellie Blake, Maytown, Program Director of the Lancaster County Lung Association, announces the February Pulmonary Function Screening. The test will be held at the Association office, 630 Janet Avenue, Lancaster, Pa., on Tuesday, February 25. Hours will be 4 to 8 p.m. Please call 397-5203 for an appointment. Cost of the test is \$2.00.

This test is not an x-ray of the chest but rather measures the lung capacity of the individual. The test is performed by a respiratory therapist and results read by a pulmonary specialist. Reports are forwarded to the family physician as well as the individual.

Anyone who is experiencing any difficulty with breathing or is a heavy smoker would be advised to have the screening.

Selecting subjects for this column about married love is even more important than writing about them.

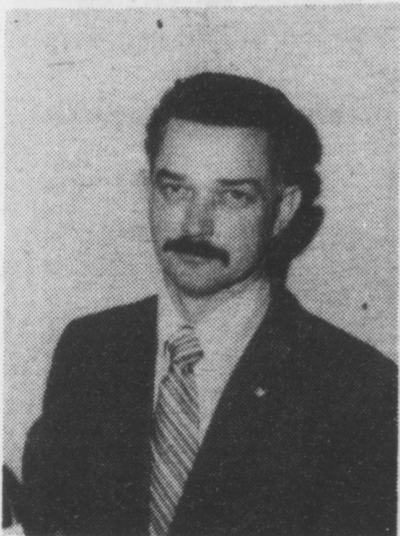
The editors of the Bulletin believe there are many couples who ought to be written about in "Adam and
