Then, they are ready to start their regular school day.

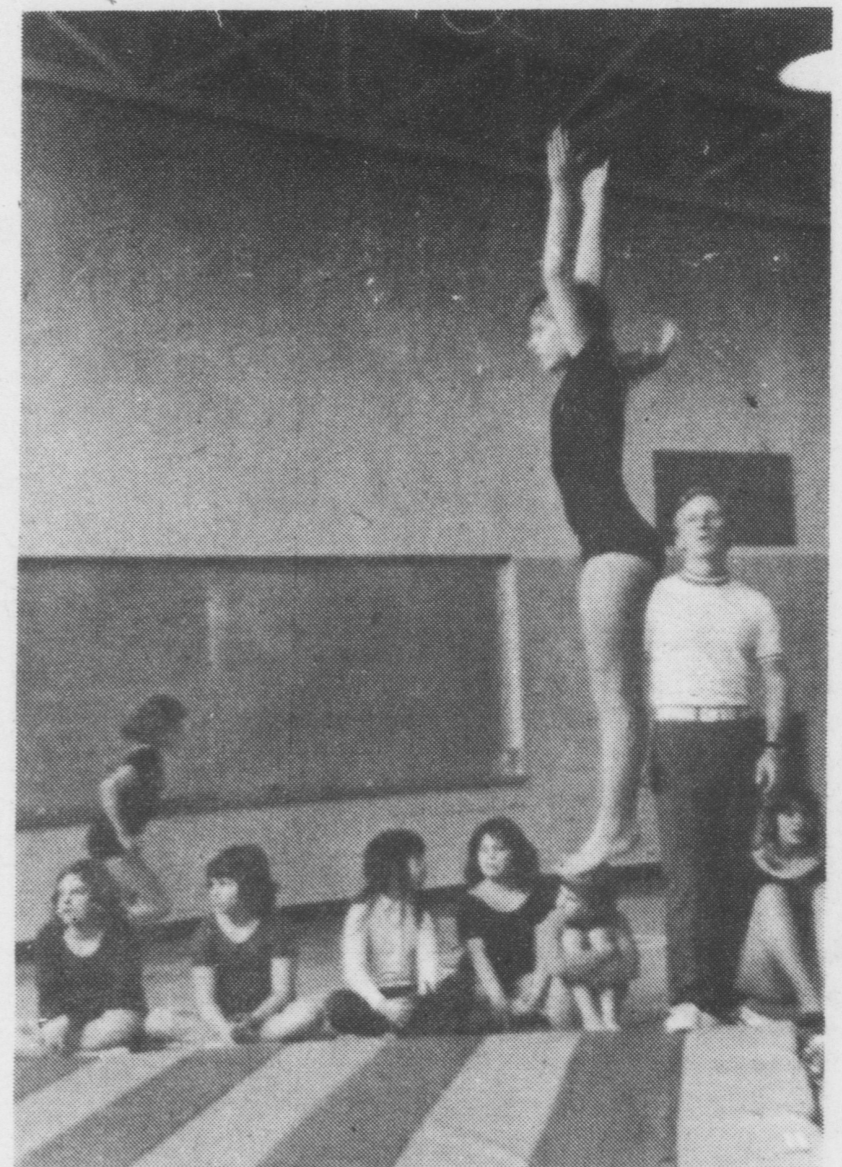
This January it was still dark when they arrived at Seiler.

Marietta takes share of tax

"With regrets," Marietta Borough informed Donegal School Board last week that it plans to take one-half of the one percent earned income tax, instead of one-quarter as previously.

Marietta's action followed Mount Joy Council's decision to take the full one-half to which the municipalities are entitled. Mount Joy's decision automatically gave one-half of the one percent tax to every other municipality in the school district, including not only Marietta, but East Donegal Township, and Mount Joy Township.

As a result of the municipalities' taking one-half of tax, the school district will now receive one-half also, instead of one-quarter as previously.

Last month, school board members predicted an 8½ mills increase in school taxes in the district.

The board received a request from Pioneer Fire Company, Marietta, asking tax exemption for the fire house now under construction. The board tabled the request.

School directors also in-

creased the monthly bus contract rate for Kraybill Mennonite School pupils to \$8. The reason for the increase was the recent purchase of a new school bus.

Mrs. Donna Murray, first grade teacher at Maytown, was granted a maternity leave. Mrs. Mary Y. Royer, full time substitute, was named to fill the vacancy.

Appointed assistant coaches were Randy Bussard, baseball, and Linda Kadingo, girls track.

Warren Hayman was again appointed to serve as district playground director.
