She has a collection of thousands of school pictures of "her" children. There are no names written on the backs of the pictures; yet, Mrs. Pennell can identify each one.

She recalls experiences she had with children years ago, and tears moisten her eyes as she remembers them.

A lot of her "children" now have children of their own. Her grown-up children come back to see her, often at her station on Barbara and Main.

She also has "children" at St. Mark's United Methodist Church, where she is Sunday School teacher for children aged two to four.

She buys presents for her many children, sometimes going to rummage sales and buying clothes for those who need them. She tells the parents someone gave her the clothes.

The Bulletin wondered what made Helen Pennell such a motherly person. It isn't that she just likes children. She likes all people of all ages. Several years ago when her husband Bruce was seriously injured at work and was hospitalized for a long period, Mrs. Pennell visited other people too from Mount Joy who were patients in the same hospital with her husband.

The Bulletin decided that a good mother is no different from a good person, a person who likes all people, including little people.
