Need I say, the war bond was found much later--when the bureau drawer in which it was kept was pulled the whole way out--there was the bond where it had slipped.

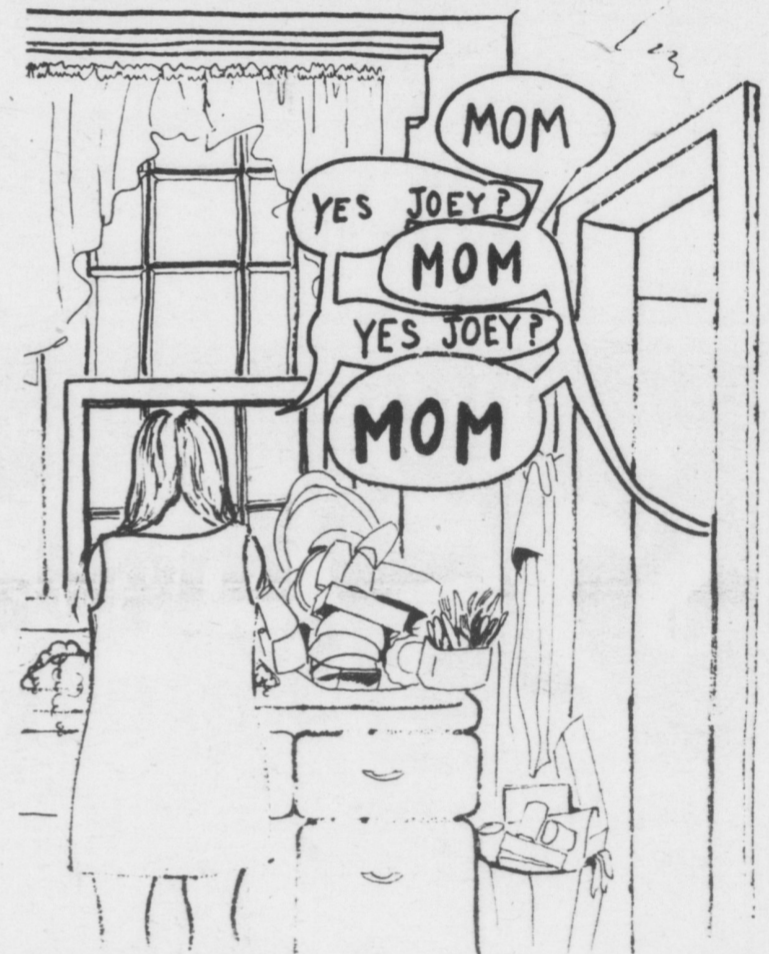
Whether you like it or not
