Scouts get Bicen. emblem

This seal is the emblem of the Lancaster-Lebanon Council, Boy Scouts of America for local Scout Bicentennial events. The weathervane symbolizes the geographic arrangement of the several Scout Districts, and is topped with a distelfink bird which is a Council motif. The central hex sign is derived from an early Pennsylvania German

traktur and symbolizes the ancestral heritage of pre-revolution settlers of the two countries. The fleur-de-lis is the universal Scouting symbol and is reproduced to form a border of red and blue on white, the colors of our National flag.

The seal was designed by Robert L. Horst, who is the Bicentennial Activity Committee Chairman for the local Scout organization.

Bateman says that the Borough cannot legally sell the property directly to the Graybills. If the Borough did want to unload the property it would be compelled to do so at a public auction or by sealed bids. By either method the Graybills would not be guaranteed that they could acquire the property.

But the Borough is absolutely opposed to selling public land, especially land that is part of the Borough Park. The house

and the grounds at Manheim and Barbara Streets will be available to the public for educational and recreational use while being improved and maintained by the Historical Society.

"It's going to be a hardship. I feel for Mrs. Graybill personally." Bateman said, but he believes that the Borough had no civic or legal choice except to stop renting public property on a private basis and to enlarge the facilities available to the public.
