A 65-yard pass play from Steve Butz to Steve Meszaros just before the end of the first quarter resulted in six points for Donegal and when Butz sneaked over for the PAT, Donegal led 7-0. The score remained that until midway

through the tourth quarter when Meszaros scampered around end for a 21-yard TD run. A Meszaros to Neal pass added the 2-point conversion and Donegal led 15-0, which is the way the score stood when the final gun sounded. Meanwhile, the defense once again took charge. With Phil Landis and Jeff Kauffman making tackles all over the field, the Braves shut off the home team's offense very well. Cory Heisey, Doug Benard, Leonard Mummau, John Haugh, Frank Brommer, Steve Neal and Tony Mann added their weight to the defense and the total result was a big zero for Manor Ridge.

The "C" team survived a last quarter scare and hung on to score a thrilling 7-6 victory which kept their unbeaten streak intact. Donegal jumped out to a 7-0 lead early in the second quarter when Tom Luckabaugh teamed up with Shawn Maxwell for a picture-book 50-yard pass and run play for the TD. Daryl Risberg bulled over for the PAT and Donegal led 7-0. Risberg, Luckabaugh, Bill Miller and Brian Carbaugh led a sputtering offense which was hard-pressed by the home team, but managed that all-important one score. The defense, led by Eric Brenner, Kevin Fantom, Gene Wagner, Gilbert Cornwell, John Yohe and Scott Hostetter (who recovered a fumble) held Manor Ridge at bay until late in the last quarter when several pass plays plus a 15-yard penalty put the ball on Donegal's 2-yard line with first and goal to go and less than 2 minutes to play. After holding for three plays, Manor Ridge plunged over for the score. The 2-point conversion pass attempt was broken up by Carbaugh and Donegal appeared to have it sewed up, but after failing to move the ball on the ensuing kick-off, Donegal was forced to give up the ball. Manor Ridge tried three unsuccessful passes and on fourth down Carbaugh stepped in front of the intended pass receiver and intercepted that last gasp attempt.

Next Sunday, October 5, the Braves will entertain Middletown Catholic in a non-league contest at the DHS field at 1:00 p.m. as they hope to sharpen their skills for the run for division titles for both the "A" and "C" teams.
