Brief Items.

A son of Dr. Stites, of Millers-town, had his face considerably burned while trying to protect his fathers property during the time the Valley House was burning.

Cornelius Shaffer, a married man and a former resident of this county was arrested in Clearfield county, and taken to Newport from where Squire Zinn committed him to jail on the charge of fornication.

On last Thursday night some thief entered the premises of Mr. John J. Craig, in Wheatfield twp., and stole about one hundred pounds of pork, a quantity of dried beef, and about fifteen dollars worth of carpenter tools.

The Juniata Valley House at Millers-town took fire again on Monday night and was entirely destroyed. It is probable that fire was burning under the floors all day Monday after it was supposed the flames were all extinguished.

Most of the personal property and the merchandise was removed.

Local Option Meeting.—A Local Option meeting was held at the Court House in Bloomfield on Friday evening last, 1877.

The meeting was organized by electing Wm. Burns President, and D. Mickey and G. S. Barnett, secretaries, and was then opened by prayer by Rev. P. Sheeder. On motion Rev. J. Edgar, Rev. G. Dunlap and Samuel Sanderson, were appointed a committee to draft resolutions, to be presented to the meeting.

On motion, Rev. P. Sheeder, Samuel Dunbar, Wm. Grier, and Adam Clark were made a committee to report two lady canvassers from each church to be appointed to canvass the town to procure signatures to petitions to be presented to the Legislature praying the passage of a Local Option law or its equivalent.

Mr. W. D. Blackburn of Local Option executive committee, was then introduced, who addressed the meeting in a forcible and telling speech setting forth the merits of the law and giving facts and figures to show the good that was accomplished by it when formerly in force and which would undoubtedly result from the passage of the law now asked.

The Committee on resolutions reported a series of resolutions approving the former law and asking the passage of the proposed law and directing a copy of the proceedings to be sent to the member, and Senator from this district.

The committee to report canvassers report the following named persons as canvassers: Mrs. Burn; Miss Clara McIntire; Miss Mary Crist; Miss Mary A. Clark; Mrs. Mary O. Pennell and Miss Mary Clegg, who were appointed. Adjourned with Doxology and Benediction.

Weather Report.—B. McIntire, Esq., hands us the following report of the average for the month of February.—Average of Thermometer at 8 o'clock A. M. 30° and 25° and of Barometer, 30 inches, minus six tenths.—Average of greatest degree of heat, 40 degrees and 2 minutes and of lowest degree of cold 23 degrees and 45 minutes. There fell 2 inches of rain and 6 inches of snow. The warmest day was Friday, the second, the thermometer running up to 48 degrees above zero, and the coldest was Wednesday the 14th the mercury sinking to 15 above zero. There were 20 days of clear weather and this was the warmest February for eighteen years.

Cumberland County.—We copy the following from the Cumberland county papers of last week:

About 11 o'clock on Monday night the citizens of Shippensburg were aroused by the cry of "fire," occasioned by the burning of the stables, belonging to Henry Hollar and Wm. Beaver, respectively, situated between the railroad and Penn street. Loss, \$1,200,000; partly insured.

About two hours later the stables adjoining the "Madison House" were discovered to be on fire, and in a short time thereafter were reduced to ashes. Loss, \$800,00; partly insured. These fires were, we learn, the work of the incendiary. The fire companies did effective service.

Just after dinner on Tuesday, Mr. Peter Humer, a citizen of Carlisle, died suddenly in Dr. Kieffer's office, of neuralgia of the chest. Mr. H. had felt badly for some days, and called on Dr. Kieffer for advice and medicine. The doctor was about to prescribe for him, when Mr. H. suddenly sank in his chair, and breathed heavily once or twice, and expired. Mr. H. was about 70 years of age.

Dr. Hatten, a dentist of Shippensburg, and two other persons were taken to the Cumberland county jail Thursday on a charge of assisting in the destruction of five stables in Shippensburg on Monday night. Alex. Mateer, who has served several terms in the penitentiary, has also been arrested for complicity in the arson. Dr. Hatten enjoyed a good reputation until a few years ago, when he became reckless and from that time is said to have been loose in his habits. Altogether five or six are in custody for being concerned in the incendiary act. On one of the parties a pistol taken from one of the stores on the night of the fire was found. The evidence against the accused is believed to be sufficiently conclusive to convict them, or at least a majority of them.

Considerable excitement was occasioned in Carlisle about 4 o'clock Monday afternoon by the announcement of the death, by suicide, of J. P. Hassler, late cashier of Carlisle Deposit bank.

About four months ago it was discovered that Mr. Hassler, had overdrawn his bank account about \$11,000. The money was lost in speculations and failing to replace it at 12 o'clock Monday, he was arrested on a charge of embezzlement, bail being demanded in the sum of \$15,000. Not going to his dinner at one o'clock, his usual time, his son went in search of him, and about 4 o'clock he was found in the attic of his house hanging to a rafter, and dead.

The coroner's inquest held upon the body found a verdict in accordance with the above facts.

A most singular circumstance connected with Mr. Hassler's hanging is, that about twelve years ago he cut down the body of W. H. Beeten, cashier of the same bank, who like himself was a defaulter, and who was found hanging in the same attic to the same rafter. Beeten's default amounted to some \$15,000, but was made good out of his own property.

Mr. Hassler was about fifty years of age, had an interesting family, was highly respected, and was an elder in the German Reformed church.
