Mange in a Horse.

Mange in a horse should be treated as follows: Make an ointment, of lard twelve parts, carbolic acid one part, and sulphur two parts. Rub these together thoroughly, until it is well mixed and smooth. Work some of this ointment into the affected portions of the skin twice a day. Give an ounce of flowers of sulphur daily in the feed, until the perspiration of the horse smells strongly of it, then discontinue it, but continue the use of the ointment for some time longer, until the skin recovers a healthy appearance. Whitewash the stables and stalls with lime, cover the floor also with it, as the mange insect will live upon the woodwork for months, and return to the horse if not destroyed.—*American Agriculturist.*

Pruning.

It is now admitted by all who have given attention to the subject, and it is in accordance with both theory and practice, that to favor a free growth of the shoots and leaves, pruning should be performed while trees are dormant and leafless. On the other hand, to check growth, and to promote fruitfulness, the pruning should be done on the tree in leaf and growing. We know of no cultivators who dissent from these truths. It is commonly admitted also that summer pruning favors a more speedy healing of the wounds.

When a cow's milk suddenly dries up and becomes clotted in the udder, it is probably due to garget or inflammation to the udder from some one of many causes. The udder is then hard or lumpy, and hot. A remedy is to give the cow at once 8 or 12 ounces Epsom salts, with half an ounce of saltpetre, repeating the latter in six hours. If the milk is difficult to draw, a solution of one ounce of carbonate of soda in a pint of water should be injected in the teats with a syringe, and then milked out. This will bring away the curdled milk which, if left in will make matters very much worse. If the cow is feverish, the saltpetre may be repeated for a day or two. To bathe the udder in cold water, rubbing and squeezing it gently for a considerable time, is useful.

Lemon Jelly Cake.

One pint of flour, the same of white sugar, five eggs beaten separately, one tablespoonful of butter, one teaspoonful of cream of tartar, one-half a teaspoonful of soda; when well mixed, four tablespoonful of cold water. For the jelly take two cups of sugar, yolks of three eggs, the juice and grated rind of three lemons; cook till thickened by setting in boiling water, then add the beaten white of three eggs; spread between the layers of the cake and trim off the rough edges.

A Cheap Liniment.

Take equal parts of hog's lard and coal oil, melt the lard and put the coal oil into it while hot, and stir well before each using. Rub the part affected with the preparation, rub well and heat by the fire until the skin is hot. More benefit will be derived from this preparation than most costly liniment.
