

Balls in Place of Birds.

Captain A. H. Bogardus, of Kikhart, Ill., champion wing shot, has made a match of novel character with a prominent citizen of New York. He has bet \$500 even that he will break 1,000 glass balls in 2 hours and forty minutes, the balls to be sprung from three or four traps, though only one ball to be sent into the air at a time. The shooter will stand eighteen yards from the traps, and no ball to be counted unless broken before striking the ground. It is also stipulated that Bogardus shall use one gun throughout the match, unless the gun becomes disabled, when another gun can be chosen. Two sets of barrels are allowed and he will confine himself to 14 ounce shot. In order to give the people of that city and vicinity an opportunity of witnessing this trial against time, skill and endurance, Gilmore's Garden has been engaged for Friday evening, 16th inst., when the shooting will take place. This is the first time the Captain has ever attempted the feat, and he is of the opinion that to win he must average ninety broken balls in 100 and fire fully 1,000 shots. Though not confident, he has hopes of success, yet if he fails, he is willing to bet \$1,000 against \$500 that there is no man in the world who can break them quicker than he will. Bogardus has recently returned from California, where he astonished all the crack shots of that section, and though not quite so well satisfied with the trip as he was with his journey to England, it was, on the whole, satisfactory. The shooting at Gilmore's will commence at eight P. M., sharp.

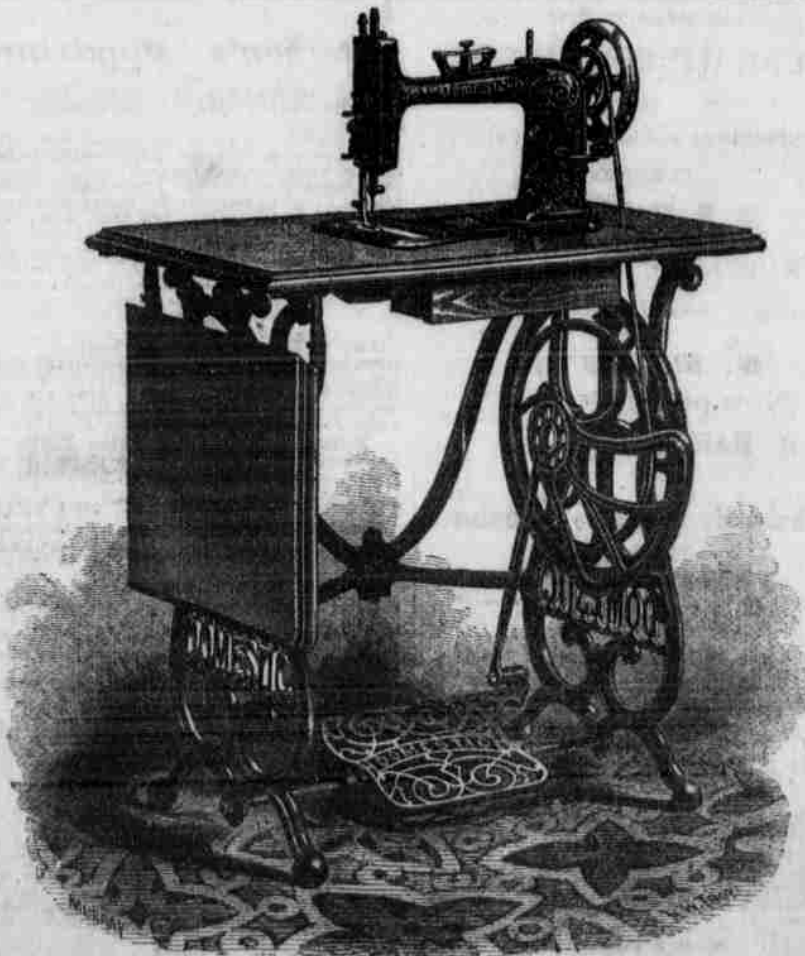
