She made him a good 'frau,' he said, and now that he has revered her memory three years, he wishes to cry the Bayview lottery once more. Colonel Snyder furnished a permit to the institution, accompanied by a note to Superintendent Mitchell 'to accomodate the bearer' and the old man went on his way rejoicing. In the afternoon he returned in company with his wife, both of them as happy as the circumstances would permit. 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
