

varieties, will stand neglect, yet do well: Asters, balsams, dlanthus, petunias, phlox, calliopsis, verbenas, sweet peas, miginonette, cinnias, marlgolds, and portulacas. The same writer again says : "The plants I have named will afford a profusion of flowers from June to October. Phlox will be the first to blossom, and then petunins will come on, and both of these flowers continue to increase in beauty until hard frosts come. Asters will be in perfection in August and September. Californis begins to blossom in July, and nearly all the others come on early in that month. If old flowers are removed and not allowed to go to seed, you will have a much greater profusion of bloom. If you do not remove faded flowers, but allow them to perfect seed, you will soon see that your plants are losing a large share of their former glory. You can't expect a plant to ripen seed and blossom profusely at the same time."

## Fruit Law.

A bill has been presented to the Vermont legislature, on petition of S. W. Jewett and others, to protect fruit growers by compelling people to take proper care of their trees, on penalty of fine if found guilty of wanton neglect. We know of many cases where such a law, if enforced, would be of great benefit to communities. A single tree sometimes becomes the pest distributor of a large neighborhood, which if attended to in season might be wholly prevented.

Becisteak may be covered while broiling, but should never be backed while cooking, nor pounded before cooking; simply lay it upon the gridiron, and turn it but once, as at every turning you lose the juice of the meat; when done, hy upon the dish it is to be served in, sprinkle over it a little salt and spread over it some good sweet butter. and let stand five minutes in the oven.
