#### Earthquake in South America.

PANAMA, June 11.— By the arrival of the steamer "Oroya," from Callao, on the 28th ult., we have fuller details of the disasters suffered on the coast from earthquakes and 'tidal waves. The towns of Ariea, Iquique, Ponta de Labas, Pahellon de Rica, Chanavaya, Huanillas, Tocopilla, Corija, Mejiltones de Bolivar, Autafagasta and Chanarl are nearly all destroyed. About 600 lives only were lost. The destruction of property is estimated at \$20,-000,000, confined mostly to the coast, although the town of Tarapaca, twentythree leagues inland, and the villages of Rica, Matilla and Cinchoues, far in the interior, were more or less rained. The shipping of guano from the southern deposits will be indefinitely suspended as all facilities in the way of launches, chutes, wharves, water condensers and buildings of all kinds have been swept away.

Antafagasta, Mexillones, Tocopilla and Cobija, towns in the coast of Bolivar, met with the same misfortune of earthquake and tidal wave at once and are in an identical condition with Iquique and Aricia. At Antafagasta several lives were lost. Mexillones was visited by a tidal wave sixty-five feet in height. Two-thirds of the town was completely obliterated. At Mexillones six persons were drowned, At Tocopilla little or nothing remains of the town. A mine called La Pena Blanco, four miles to the southward, sank it, smothering 200 workmen, of whom forty were Cornish miners.

Cobija, the principal town of the Bolivian coast, has lost three-fourths of it; houses. The wave, thirty-five feet high, swept the main business street and left it as level as the desert. Wharves and launches were all carried out to sea. All of these towns are in the greatest distress. Chili has escaped without injury. The northern ports of Peru were damaged but little, although the sea was running remarkably high. Efforts for the relief of the distressed are being made. Chaniva Ya, the little town at the guano deposit known at Paballor De Pica, with four hundred houses, to-day has only two standing. Here, as at Iquique, the earthquake was followed by fire. The sea came in and extinguished the conflagration, but as it retired carried off all that remained of the place. In one of the guano cuttings thirty laborers were buried by the falling earth and suffocated. Amongst the shipping at least 200 people were killled. Bodies were floating around in the bay and pestilence is feared. At Hoanillos, another guano loading station, the damage inflicted was fearful; all the houses were destroyed. The wave which succeeded the earthquake and completed the work of destruction, was nearly sixty feet high.
