**New Pension Law.**  
**UNDER** an act of Congress approved March 3,  
 1873, widows of officers who were killed, or  
 died of disease contracted in the service, are now  
 entitled to \$2.00 per month for each of their chil-  
 dren.  
 The guardian of a minor child of a soldier who  
 heretofore only received \$5.00 per month pension  
 is now entitled to \$10.00 per month.  
 Soldiers who receive invalid pensions can now  
 have their pensions increased to any sum or rate  
 between \$5. and \$15. per month.  
 Soldiers who have lost their discharges can now  
 obtain duplicates.  
 Fathers and mothers who lost sons in the ser-  
 vice upon whom they were dependent for support,  
 can also obtain pensions.
