of being able to make it contract with Russia to mitten Tarkey on Knuunes whent. Corn is growing tinely, and promises an unusaally large yield. It is frar in ndvance of ilinois corn. Old corn li quoted at 25c. per bushel ; new
whent, No. 3, at 85c.; No. 4 , 70e.; No, 2, Whent, No. 3, at 850.; No. 4, 700.; No, 2
Ohe. gets. Now the Atchison, Topeka and Sinnta Fo Ralliond steps in and robs the grain buyer, to the tune of 18 cents per bushel, for transporting the gruin 228
