"Bull-dozing" a Jury.

An Irish judge has his own ideas of jus. tice, and is bent upon making the jury register his decision. At the Munster Assizes a fortnight ago, a prisoner was charged with a dastardly assault upon a young peasant in the picturesque vale of the Lakes of Killarney. In charging the jury, the judge commented upon the indisputable character of the evidence against the prisoner and the beloousness of the offense; but the twelve gentlemen in the box made up their minds at once, and without retiring from the court, returned a verdict of not guilty on the graver charge, and convicted of a common assault. The judge was very angry. "What's the meaning of a verdict of this kind?" he shouted to the foreman. "The evidence is all one way, and there is not a scintilla the other way. I will not receive such a verdict. Gentlemen you had better retire to your room." The injunction was obeyed, and after some consideration the twelve good men and true, returned to court and found a verdict of guilty on the more serious count in the indictment.

Arrest of Counterfeiters.

Several important arrests of counterfeiters have been made by the United States secret service division within the past week. Ten counterfeiters in differont sections of the country have been arrested within the past four days, and it seems that all of them were very plentifully supplied with counterfeit money, including bogus greenbacks, national bank notes and silver. The bureau has information showing that there is now an immense amount of counterfeiting in operation throughout the country, a considerable portion of which is in the manufacture of counterfeit silver. With the exception of one party who has not been captured, and who makes an excellent imitation of the real coin, the work is generally of poor character, and the spurious coinage can readily be detected.

He Saved His Carpet Bag.

The Charlotte, N. C., Observer relates how a negro man was on a long trestle when he saw the train thundering in his rear. With wonderful presence of mind he threw himself outside of the track, and clung to the ends of the ties, lying flat upon his face on the very edge of the trestle. Quick as thought the engineer applied the air brakes and brought the train down to a very low rate of speed. The train stopped, the negro climbed upon the platform of a car, and was brought on to the depot. Through all the different changes of the adventure, he had retained his carpet-bag in his hand, and as he jumped off the train at the depot, he waved it over his head and saluted the engineer.
