Death of a Millionaire Miser.

A Cincinnati paper says : An inventory has been taken of the property of the late Jerry Tullis, an eccentric old bachelor, who died near this city recently in circumstauces of actual want, and it fully bears out the stories that were current as to his great wealth. He had titles to about 500,-000 acres of land located in different States of the West and South. In Cincinnati alone he owned 40 houses, 10 of them in one block, and in Hamilton county, outside of Cincinnati, he had not less than 900 acres of valuable land. He had 40,000 acres in Kentucky, a recent purchase, worth about \$100,000, and 12,000 in Iowa, for which he was lately offered \$12 an acre.

He also had a large amount in government securities, investing at one time \$ 90,-000. His taxes in Hamilton county last year amounted to \$6,000. He has a nephew and other relatives living here, and it is believed that he left a will, but search up to the present time has failed to discover the document. It is expected that litigation will follow, and lawyers are looking for fat pickings.
