Rain has been so abundant this season that the levees would not hold the water in the rivers, and the great valley of the Sacramento is covered with about five feet of water.

The rains have abated and the water is lowering, although the prospects for crops are gone for this season in this valley. Yet the rains will prove a godsend to those portions of the State which were not inundated.
