Things Worth Knowing.

That fish may be sealed much easier by first dipping into boiling water about a minute.

Salt fish are quickest and best freshened by soaking in sour milk.

That milk which has turned or changed may be sweetened and rendered fit for use again by stirring in a little soda.

That salt will curdle with milk; hence, in preparing milk porridge, gravies, etc., the salt should not be added until the dish is prepared.

That fresh meat, after beginning to sour, will sweeten if placed out of doors in the cool air over night.

That clear boiling water will remove tea stains and many fruit stains. Pour the water through the stain, and thus prevent it from spreading over the fabric.

That ripe tomatoes will remove ink and other stains from white cloth; also from the hands.

That a tablespoonful of turpentine boiled with your white clothes will greatly aid the whitening process.

That boiled starch is much improved by the addition of a little sperm, or a little salt, or both, or a little gum arabic dissolved.

That beeswax and salt will make your rusty flat-irons as clean and smooth as glass. Tie a lump of wax in a rag, and keep it for the purpose. When the irons are hot, rub them first with the wax rag, then scour with a paper or cloth sprinkled with salt.

That kerosene applied to bedsteads, is an unerring bed-bug remedy, and that a coat of whitewash is ditto for the walls of a log house.

That kerosene oil will soften boots or shoes which have been hardened by water, and render them as pliable as new.

That kerosene will make your tin kettle as bright as new. Saturate a woolen rag, and rub with it. It will also remove stains from and clean varnished furniture.

That cold rain water and soap will remove machine grease from washable fabrics.

Change of Air.

An occasional change of air may be said to be almost necessary to the well being of every man. Every workman must leave his workshop, the student his library and the lawyer his office, or sooner or later his health will pay the penalty; and this matter how great his temperance in eating and drinking; no matter how vigorously and regularly he uses his limbs; no matter how open and dry and free from impurity may be the air of which he is employed. In the slightest case of impaired health, the sleeping in the suburbs of the town in which the life is chiefly spent, or even spending a few hours of detached days in some accessible rural districts at a few miles' distance from the dwelling, may suffice to restore the healthy balance of the bodily functions, and maintain the bodily machine in a fit state for its duties; or in cases of somewhat more aggravated character, a few days once or twice a year may suffice to re-adjust or restore the due economy of the system.

How to Black Stoves.

If you mix the Rising Sun polish with turpentine, and then apply it to the stove with a brush, and rub it in well, it will be more durable, and look more glossy, than if mixed with cold tea, vinegar or water. The turpentine will also keep it from rusting, and will make it look quite as good as new. When the stoves are put away until autumn, it is a good plan to brush this mixture all over them, and it will become well hardened, and will not burn off as quickly as if applied when they are in use, and they will not rust at all, no matter how damp the season may be.

Flavoring for Meat Hash and Force-Meat.

One tablespoonful each of Black Pepper, Cayenne Pepper; two tablespoonfuls each of Cloves, and of Nutmeg. Keep this mixture dry and closed from the air. In using it, take about the proportion of one part of this flavoring mixture to four parts of salt—a tablespoonful of the spiced salt for each pound of chopped meat.

A correspondent writes to the Scientific American that the worst toothache, or neuralgia coming from the teeth, may be speedily and delightfully ended by the application of a bit of clean cotton, saturated in a solution of ammonia to the affected tooth. Sometimes the late sufferer is prompted to momentary laughter by the application, but the pain has disappeared.

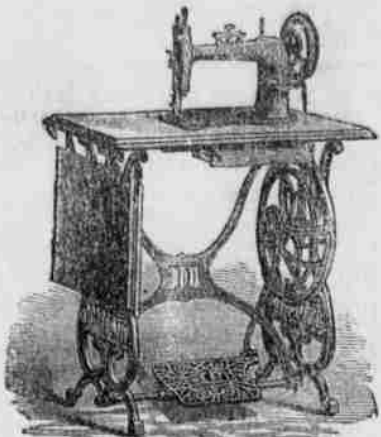
