The latest dispatches last week confirm the previous accounts of serious trouble in progress at Waterproof, La. A report was received at Natchez that fighting had been going on, and that thirty-six negroes were killed and the remainder dispersed.

Miscellaneous News Items.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 15.—Nine persons dug through the wall of the Kokomo, Indiana, jail last night and escaped to the woods.

Faber Sellers, a leading citizen of Pottstown, Pa., fell dead in his store at that place on Saturday evening. He had been suffering from heart disease.

A Providence swindler coolly sold a house to which he had no claim, and received \$2,703 for the forged title.

SAN FRANCISCO, October 16.—The constitutional convention to-day adopted a resolution to memorialize Mr. Hayes and the United States senate to so modify the Burlingame treaty as to prohibit Chinese immigration.

Twenty prisoners escaped from the city jail of Rochester N. Y., on Saturday a week. They bored through a wall and scaled an enclosure.

"One of them" writes to the New York Sun that "there are in the cities of New York and Brooklyn at least 1,500 young white women who have married negroes, and the number is rapidly increasing."

The wife of William Mitchell, living south of Shelbyville, Ind., eight miles, was nursing a babe, six weeks old, by the stove, when she was taken with a fit.

At Pittsburg Monday morning Frank Gunnel got into an altercation with his wife and knocked her down, when William Hart interfered, and, seizing Gunnel by the throat, threw him down.

Daniel Lindemuth, of Reading, when he recently received his pay from the Reading Railroad, placed about forty dollars in an envelope. It got mixed up with some papers in his pocket, and he threw them all in the fire, and thus by accident contributed so much to cancelling the national debt.

CONCORD, October 15.—The Concord savings bank has been compelled to close its doors. It is believed the depositors will receive about 90 per cent. It was formerly the National saving bank, and suffered a loss of money by the defalcation of W. W. Storrs, its former treasurer, now a fugitive from justice.

A family of emigrants, on the way to Texas, camped over night in Sedalia, Mo. In the morning the man packed all the things in the wagon to continue the journey, except his aged mother-in-law, whom he left at the side of the road.

A wealthy but drunken farmer in Hinesville, Ga., stood up in a camp meeting and asked to be prayed for. A clergyman made the desired prayer, in which he characterized the farmer as an exceedingly wicked man.

MONTPELIER, Vt., Oct. 15.—Justin S. Morrill was re-elected United States Senator this afternoon. The vote stood as follows: In the House, Morrill, 161; Dickey, 50; H. H. Powers, 9; E. J. Phelps, 4; C. C. Martin, 2; Frederick Billings, 1.

A ship canal through the peninsula of Florida, from Matanzas inlet to the head of navigation on the Suwanee river, to unite the Atlantic with the Gulf of Mexico, is proposed. The length of the cut is seventy-five miles.

DANVILLE, October 15.—The democratic conferees for the Twenty-fourth senatorial district, who have been holding meetings for several weeks past, and have been unsuccessful in making a nomination, last night a few minutes before midnight, nominated Mr. Jackson, of Sullivan county.

A terrible affair happened in a traveling menagerie visiting at Henly, England, the other day. A visitor entered the tent and incautiously went inside the ropes surrounding the lioness's cage, when the animal shot forth her paws and grasped the poor fellow, tearing open the left side of his face and destroying the muscles of his right shoulder and arm.

NEW YORK, October 15.—The box which was stolen from the First national bank, of Fishkill Landing, last Wednesday, was found yesterday in the woods on the highlands about three miles below Garrison's near the spot where the robbers abandoned their horses and wagon and took to the freight train.

POTTSVILLE, Oct. 15.—James Hurley was arrested this evening and committed in default of \$10,000, upon the charge of attempting to wreck the express train at Auburn Station, Pa., on the 23rd of September. This was the third attempt to wreck passenger trains at that point.
