#### A Murderer at Large.

Allen C. Laros, the murderer of his father and mother and Moses Schug, an aged man, boarding with the Laros family, made his escape from the Harrisburg State Lunatic Hospital last week. A commission of medical experts having decided that he was insane, he was removed to the institution about a year ago. He gradully improved under medical treatment, and the propriety of removing him to Easton, Northampton county, and giving Governor Hartranft another opportunity to hang the murderer was discussed. Laros was apprised of the contemplated action of the authorities, and took advantage of the first opportunity to escape, the murderer having been allowed to walk about the hospital grounds. All efforts to capture the fugitive have thus far been futile.

Laros was to have been hauged on September 20, 1877, but the execution did not occur because of the report of the Commision of Lunacy. Should the fugitive be captured the Governor would no doubt issue another warrant for the execution of the criminal, as it is believed that his mind has been restored sufficiently to justify such an action. Laros threw poison into a coffee pot about two years ago and his father, mother, Moses Schug and all the Lares family except Allen drank of the coffee and were made sick, but they all recovered except the old people. Allen confessed the crime, and stated that he had committed it to obtain several hundred dollars belonging to his father and Moses Schug. The money was found buried near the Laros residence, where the murderer said he secreted it.

#### Dueling with Cowhides.

BOYDTON, Va., Oct. 15 .- One of the most remarkable duels on record occurred in this place to-day. Virginia has been famous for all kinds of affairs of honor, but it remained for the Hon. A. Hackett and Col. H. W. Krouhmeir to inaugurate a method of duelling up to this time unknown to the code. Mr. Hackett was until recently the editor-in-chief of the Mecklinberg Democrat, and Krouheimer his associate, and now editor-in-chief. The misunderstanding culminating in this affair of honor grew out of an article written by Hackett while editor of the Democrat, in favor of inflation of the currency, which his associate bitterly opposed and denounced in strong terms. Hackett on this account resigned his position on the paper, and in the last issue Kroubeimer, in a caustic article, bade his late associate farewell. To-day it was known on the street that the latter had expressed his determination to cowhide the former on sight. Late in the evening Krouheimer was walking down the street, accompanied by his brother Benjamin, when he was met by Hackett, also accompanied by one of his brothers. Hackett at once made the attack, A. Hackett and H. W. Krouheimer using cowhides, Wm. Hackett the buttend of a large pistol, and Ben Krouheimer a knife. It is generally understood that Krouheimer got the best of the cowhiding, but he received several severe licks over the head from the hammer of the pistol. The cowhiders were both severely injured.—Chicago Times.

An incident illustrating the amenities of Oriental life is thus related by the Truth: "I wonder how many men on board our fleet in the sea of Marmora are aware that at the back of Prince's island, not seventy years ago, the whole harem of the Sultan Selim was drowned, to the number of three hundred. The said Selim had been murdered by his nephew Moustapha, who in turn was murdered by his brother Mahmoud. This last was much attached to his uncle Selim, and he suspected that the women had sided in his uncle's murder, or, at all events. had made no efforts to save his life. Many of them were quite young, and the harem included French, Italian, and German girls. According to the orders of this ferocious barbarian, each one was tied up in a sack, and the next morning at daybreak they were embarked in barges from the quays of the seraglio, and taken by the eunuchs to the place appointed, when they were successively thrown into the sea, Their screams were heard miles away, and some not only got out of the sacks, but threw themselves into the water and endeavored to swim to shore. They were overtaken by the guards and were killed, either by being run down or by being beaten on the head with the heavy oars."

### Miscellaneous News Items.

SUNBURY, Pa., October 21. - John O'Nein was sentenced to death to-day by Judge Rockafeller for the murder of Coroner Hesser at Hickory Swamp, near Shamokin in December, 1874. Peter M'Manes, bis accomplice in the crime has already been sentenced to death.

JESSE POMEROY'S confinement in the Massachusetts State Prison is not having a taming effect, it is said, for he paces his cell like a enged lion, and recently, when some one gave him a kitten for a pet, be flayed it alive with a knife and fork provided for his meals.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., October 20 .- A great deal of excitement prevails here to-day over an attempt by some unknown persons to open a grave in the Mount Olivet Cemetery. The guard shot at and wounded them, but they got away. Blood tracks were discovered.

LONDON, October 20 .- The whole management of the city of Glasgow Bank, namely, the Secretary, Managing Director, and six directors were arrested on Saturday on the charge of fraud. They are confined separately and not allowed to communicate with any person. They all surrendered without trouble.

Mary Stalfa, of Traverse, Mich., stepped on a loose floor-board, and fell through into the room below, where sat a young man who had never seen her before. He may have been sentimentally impressed by the fact that she came down to him from above, for before night he asked her to marry him, and she assented ; but evidently he judged to hastily, for within two months he applied for a divorce.

An old-fashioned barbecue near Worcester was a recent incident in Butler's Massachusetts cauvass. A large ox was roasted over a big fire for twenty-four hours, and then carved, after the speeches, for a multitude. The meat was tough and badly cooked, most of it being either raw or burned, but it was all eaten, the novelty of the occasion seeming to overcome squeamishness of appetite.

An Italian exhibited a big performing bear in the streets of Weldon, N. C., and got so many pennies that he was tempted to get drunk. The bear was securely muzzled, but the showman, made daring by drink, removed the safeguard .-The beast instantly flew at him and threw him down. He shouted for help, but the spectators thought it was all in the show, and did not interfere until he was killed.

NEW YORK, October 21 .- John C. Lynch was sentenced to imprisonment for life today for killing Michael Clifton. Clifton found Lynch in company with his wife in his apartments, and seizing a chisel struck him behind the ear. Lynch rose partially stunned and left the premises. He shortly returned with a hatchet and struck Clifton a blow on the head from which the latter died nine days afterwards.

CINCINNATI, October 21 .- The failure of Stogle Brothers, of Greenfield, Ohio, is the heaviest that has occurred in that section for years. They owned the largest farm in Fayette county. It comprised 2,200 acres. The firm was to all appearance doing a lucrative business. A meeting of the creditors takes place at Chillicothe to-day. The liabilities exceed \$120,-000. The assets will probably reach ten

A correspondent of the St. Louis Globe Democrat asserts that there is no security for life or property in Texas because of "the laxity of her courts, and the patent and clearly evident bribery among some of her Judges, District Attorneys, and jurors." This is a serious charge to make against the people and officials of a great State, and, if it is true, Texas must be in a very bad condition in-

A letter from Harvey co., Kansas. says: Such has been the rush of immigration here that the homestead lands have all or nearly all been taken up, and new settlers are flocking a hundred miles farther west to enter lands free of cost. The valley of the Arkansas is pre-eminently the wheat belt of the State, and its virgin soul readily produces from fifteen to thirty bushels per acre. It is also prolific in corn, and well adapted to fruit and vegetables. The railroad has immense grants of land, which it offers at \$5 per acre on eleven years' credit, the buyer paying seven per cent. interest on his unpaid instalments.

ALLEGHENY, Oct. 22,-Late last evening an altercation occurred in the Central Exchange Saloon, Allegheny, between Chas. Bungey, a young man of respectable connection, and Conrad Hogan, a barkeeper, during which the latter received a fatal blow on the side of the head just above the ear by a poker in the hands of Bungey. At first it was thought the injury was not serious, and the contrary was not known until 9 o'clock this morning, when Hogan was found unconscious in bed and breathing heavily. Pysicians were sent for, but before they could perform an operation which they thought necessary to save the young man's life, he had breathed his last. Bungey was arrested about eleven o'clock this morning.
