

A Murderer at Large.

Allen C. Laros, the murderer of his father and mother and Moses Schug, an aged man, boarding with the Laros family, made his escape from the Harrisburg State Lunatic Hospital last week.

Laros was appraised of the contemplated action of the authorities, and took advantage of the first opportunity to escape, the murderer having been allowed to walk about the hospital grounds.

Duelling with Cowhides.

BOYDTON, Va., Oct. 15.—One of the most remarkable duels on record occurred in this place to-day. Virginia has been famous for all kinds of affairs of honor, but it remained for the Hon. A. Hackett and Col. H. W. Krouheimer to inaugurate a method of duelling up to this time unknown to the code.

Miscellaneous News Items.

SUNBURY, Pa., October 21.—John O'Neil was sentenced to death to-day by Judge Rockafeller for the murder of Coroner Heiser at Hickory Swamp, near Shamokin in December, 1874.

JESSE POMEROY's confinement in the Massachusetts State Prison is not having a taming effect, it is said, for he paces his cell like a caged lion, and recently, when some one gave him a kitten for a pet, he flayed it alive with a knife and fork provided for his meals.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., October 20.—A great deal of excitement prevails here to-day over an attempt by some unknown persons to open a grave in the Mount Olivet Cemetery. The guard shot at and wounded them, but they got away. Blood tracks were discovered.

LONDON, October 20.—The whole management of the city of Glasgow Bank, namely, the Secretary, Managing Director, and six directors were arrested on Saturday on the charge of fraud.

Mary Stalfa, of Traverse, Mich., stepped on a loose floor-board, and fell through into the room below, where sat a young man who had never seen her before. He may have been sentimentally impressed by the fact that she came down to him from above, for before night he asked her to marry him, and she assented; but evidently he judged too hastily, for within two months he applied for a divorce.

An old-fashioned barbecue near Worcester was a recent incident in Butler's Massachusetts canvass. A large ox was roasted over a big fire for twenty-four hours, and then carved, after the speeches, for a multitude. The meat was tough and badly cooked, most of it being either raw or burned, but it was all eaten, the novelty of the occasion seeming to overcome squeamishness of appetite.

An Italian exhibited a big performing bear in the streets of Weldon, N. C., and got so many pennies that he was tempted to get drunk. The bear was securely muzzled, but the showman, made daring by drink, removed the safeguard.—The bear instantly flew at him and threw him down. He shouted for help, but the spectators thought it was all in the show, and did not interfere until he was killed.

NEW YORK, October 21.—John C. Lynch was sentenced to imprisonment for life to-day for killing Michael Clifton. Clifton found Lynch in company with his wife in his apartments, and seizing a chisel struck him behind the ear. Lynch rose partially stunned and left the premises. He shortly returned with a hatchet and struck Clifton a blow on the head from which the latter died nine days afterwards.

CINCINNATI, October 21.—The failure of Stogle Brothers, of Greenfield, Ohio, is the heaviest that has occurred in that section for years. They owned the largest farm in Fayette county. It comprised 2,200 acres. The firm was to all appearance doing a lucrative business.

A correspondent of the St. Louis Globe Democrat asserts that there is no security for life or property in Texas because of "the laxity of her courts, and the patent and clearly evident bribery among some of her Judges, District Attorneys, and jurors." This is a serious charge to make against the people and officials of a great State, and, if it is true, Texas must be in a very bad condition indeed.

A letter from Harvey co., Kansas, says: Such has been the rush of immigration here that the homestead lands have all or nearly all been taken up, and new settlers are flocking a hundred miles farther west to enter lands free of cost. The valley of the Arkansas is pre-eminently the wheat belt of the State, and its virgin soil readily produces from fifteen to thirty bushels per acre. It is also prolific in corn, and well adapted to fruit and vegetables.

ALLEGHENY, Oct. 22.—Late last evening an altercation occurred in the Central Exchange Saloon, Allegheny, between Chas. Bungey, a young man of respectable connection, and Conrad Hogan, a barkeeper, during which the latter received a fatal blow on the side of the head just above the ear by a poker in the hands of Bungey. At first it was thought the injury was not serious, and the contrary was not known until 9 o'clock this morning, when Hogan was found unconscious in bed and breathing heavily. Physicians were sent for, but before they could perform an operation which they thought necessary to save the young man's life, he had breathed his last. Bungey was arrested about eleven o'clock this morning.
