A Kingdom for Gen. Grant.

A London paper's Philippopolis correspondent telegraphs on the highest authority, but attaches no importance to the report, that Gen. Grant has been proposed as a candidate for the Bulgarian throne. It seems however, that there is some foundation for the report. Under the provisions of the first and third articles of the treaty of Berlin, Bulgaria is constituted an automatic tributary principality, under the suzerainty of the Sultan, with a Christian government and a national militia. The Prince is to be elected by the population, and their choice is to be approved and confirmed by the Porte, and by England, France, Germany, Russia, Austria, and Italy. No member of any reigning European dynasty is eligible to the post, and this provision of the treaty has greatly limited the number of eligible candidates. Gen. Grant's reputation as a soldier and ruler, it is said, has led the Bulgarian nobles, who are debating among themselves the question of a ruler and details of the new constitution, to look upon him as a most desirable Prince. It is urged that he would be eminently fitted for the post. Under the provisions of the treaty of Berlin, perfect equality in political and religious rights is to be extended to all the inhabitants of Bulgaria, and it is thought that a wholly impartial foreigner like Gen. Grant can best secure the execution of laws designed to secure this equality.

A Hotel Keeper finds a Woman's Head.

A dispatch from Troy, New York, says : "This morning Mr. Case, a hotel keeper at Saratoga, was horrified to find the head of a woman on the piazza of his hotel. A dog was eating the flesh from it. Following the trail of the dog to a spot in a grove about 200 feet from the hotel, the arms, legs and other portions of a woman's body were found, all of them being in a decayed condition. A small pistol was found near by. The head had a bullet hole in it. The remains were recognized as those of a seventeen year old girl, Alice Refyea, whose parents lived in Saratoga. Several weeks ago she was employed as a servant in Case's hotel, but disappeared suddenly. No trace has since been had of her until her horribly mutilated remains were found to-day. It is supposed that the girl committed suicide."

Marrying in Haste.

Last July a Miss Haggerty visited Ocean Grove, where she met a fascinating young man who called himself Henderson. After a very short courtship they were married and visited New York, where in a day or two, the groom deserted the bride, taking all her jewelry, money, &c. Search by the brother-in-law was made for the truant, but he has not been apprehended, but it has been discovered that he is a "marrying" man, with quite a number of wives whom he has married to rob. Sudden Fall of Silver.

Considerable excitement was caused on Fourth street below Chestnut, Tuesday, by the bursting of a canvass bag containing about eighteen hundred dollars in silver. As the bright pieces rolled promiscuously over the pavement, a large number of persons were attracted to the scene, and it was found necessary to call upon the police to keep the "I will help you pick them up sir" portion of the crowd back. It took some time to gather the coin up, and strange to say there was not, so far as could be ascertained, a single piece missing.-Philadelphia Press.

A Terrible Tragedy.

A special dispatch says Joseph Stoddard, his wife and child, were found dead at their home at Pine Plains, Allegan county, Michigan, on Saturday. The head of the wife and child were blown to atoms as they lay in the bed. It is evident that Stoddard committed the deed, as when found he was sitting upright in a chair with a rifle between his legs, his hand tightly grasping the muzzle of the gun. He had often threatened to kill his wife He was of an ugly disposition and lived a dissolute life.

WOODBINE, December 3 .- On Saturday night the dwelling of Mr. Richard Champion, who resides within about two miles of Tuckahoe, Cape May county, was entered by burglars while the family were asleep, and \$1,118 stolen. The money was the proceeds of Mr. Champion's recent sale of his cranberry crop, and the burglar or burglars must have known of the presence of this money in the honse. Entrance was affected by the use of a crowbar taken from the saw mill of Captain P. M. Wheaten, near by. There is no positive clue to the robbers.

Robert Lopaz, a farmer of Ashville, N.Y., caused the death of his daughter, eight years old, by snapping a cap on a gun which he had taken down to clean, A neighbor who had borrowed the weapon left a heavy load in it, which was unknown to Lopaz. The ramrod, which was in the barrel, passed entirely through the body of the child, making a frightful wound. She died soon after.
