Court Proceedings.—Tuesday, the 10th inst., was the day of the regular Orphans' and Argument Court. These Courts were formerly merged in the general term of the Common Pleas and Quarter Sessions, but for the purpose of facilitating the discharge of business and saving expense, by an order of Court they had a separate existence established. At these Courts all accounts of Executors, Administrators and Guardians are passed upon, all arguments upon motion for new trials, rules for the opening of judgments, and all matters involving points of law requiring arguments by counsel, are heard and determined. At this term a larger amount of business than usual confronted the Court, and required a session extending into Wednesday night to complete the work.
