Spavin, Ring-Bone, etc., With Methods of Treatment.

The horse is our noblest domestic animal, perfect in structure, imposing in appearance, full of intelligence and if kindly treated giving in return an affection almost human in its nature, and performing to the last point of endurance the tasks imposed, and we may add is too often subjected to the hardest and harshest usage of any of our animals, and probably for this reason is the most liable to disease and blemishes.

Many an otherwise valuable horse is disfigured for life and rendered more or less unfit for service by ugly spavins, unsightly ring-bones, splints, ets.
