Indlan meal dough we banished from
our poultry yarda long ago, and on our poultry yards long ago, and on no
conditions would we permitt young chickens to be fed with it. For the first morning meal we give all our young poultry
stook boiled potatoes, mashed up fine. We find nothing so good and acceptable; and, as we use only the small potatoeslarge enough for the table-they prove to be more profitable than any other artical of food.
When in the days gone by, we used to
feed the clickens with the traditional feed the chickens wian mian meal dough, we always counted on losing a large percentage of them and the number that died from cholera, diarrhces and kindred diseases were great. Now a slck chicken is unknown tirely to the disuse of Indian meal dough. After the potatoes are disposed or, we give our chickens all the fine
