Bold Robbery at Camp Hill.—A correspondent writing to the Patriot from Camp Hill, Cumberland county, two miles west of the Harrisburg bridge, under date of March 8, says: "On Saturday afternoon between the hours of four and five o'clock the dwelling house of J. L. Heyd, was entered by some unknown person or persons, and three of the rooms on the second floor were ransacked. In one of the rooms was a bureau containing a tin box from which a number of valuable papers were taken, and scattered promiscuously over the floor. Our informant could not state the precise amount or value of the missing papers. From the second room there was a pocketbook taken, with some bank notes in it; also a silver watch, and all the keys belonging to Mr. Heyd. In the third room occupied by Mr. Levi Coover, brother-in-law of Mr. Heyd—there is a wardrobe, the doors of which were opened, the clothes taken down and the drawers below opened, in one of which was a tin box containing all his papers, some gold coin, which was taken. The presumption is that the entrance was made by the front, which was open at the time—the family being at supper—the hour being about 4:30 p. m. The papers are of no value to any one but to the parties to whom they belong and some of them are of great value to the owner. The return of all, or any of the property to J. L. Heyd or Levi Coover, will be reasonably rewarded. The discovery of the robbery was not made until about eight o'clock on the evening of the same day."

The Historical Tree—A Mistaken Idea.

MR. EDITOR:—We noticed an article in your paper not long since, concerning a historical tree in the "Narrows," near Concord, that this tree is the corner of four counties. We have heard it said when a boy, (though we are not very large yet,) that this tree in the Concord "Narrows," was a "corner post" of the counties of Perry, Franklin, Juniata and Huntingdon, and we were willing then to swallow the story without further investigation, until within a few years. We now refuse to swallow that hash, as it is altogether too thin. While teaching school near Concord, in 1874—5 we inquired about this tree, and we were told quite a different story by those who ought to know. The line between Franklin and Perry crosses Horse Valley about two miles east of Concord, and extends in a straight line, north, up to the top of the Tuscarora Mountain. It is fully two miles from the north west corner of Perry county to this tree in the Concord "Narrows." Cumberland County.—We copy the following from the Cumberland papers of last week:

Hon. John McCurdy died last week at his residence in Shippensburg, at an advanced age.

Capt. Ereus Beatty died at his residence on West Main street on Monday the 8th inst., aged about 61 years. Mr. Beatty has been a resident of Carlisle for 35 years and at one time owned and edited the Carlisle Herald.

A meeting of the agricultural society was held in the court house on Tuesday of last week. The 28th, 29th and 30th days of September and October 1st were named for holding the next fair.

A fire in the press room of the Valley Sentinel office at an early hour on Sunday morning, called forth the firemen and citizens in a short time. It is supposed that the fire originated from a spark falling out of the ash pan on the floor, as they had been using the press the night previous. The flames were extinguished in a few moments. We are glad to learn that Bro. Peffer's loss is light, and that it is fully insured in the Watertown of New York.

Last Wednesday night, about half-past eleven o'clock, flames were discovered issuing from the roof of a brick smoke house, belonging to the Misses Richison, corner of Pitt and Louthers streets. As usual our firemen were promptly on the ground, and in a short time succeeded in extinguishing the flames. The smoke-house had been leased by Cyrus Nickey who smoked meat by contract, and there was a considerable quantity of it in the place at the time, all of which was destroyed.

Juniata County.—We copy the following from the Juniata county papers of last week.

Mr. Solomon Herzler, one of Port Royal's oldest and most highly respected citizens, died of pneumonia, about 7 o'clock on Tuesday evening, March 2, 1880, after an illness of two weeks.

On Saturday last, Benjamin Harris, a resident of Port Royal, who engaged in quarrying limestone in the vicinity of Thompsonstown, met with a fatal accident. A blast exploded prematurely, tearing off the upper part of his face and front part of the skull. His death was almost instantaneous.

One night last week the smoke house of Kurtz Kauffman was visited and two hams and two shoulders stolen therefrom. As there were several other hams and shoulders and sides in the smoke house, aggregating some 300 pounds weight, the thief, or thieves were certainly very considerate in tariffing the lot so lightly. Mr. K. is so grateful to him or them that he offers, if he or they call upon him, he will make him or them a present of a ham, and ask no questions as to their depredation, nor give them any trouble on account of the same.

In the case stated between Geo. Spahr and John Sanderson's Executors an elaborate opinion was read by Judge Junkin. The following facts were involved and were not disputed, and therefore the case was argued some time since upon its legal status. On the 16th April, 1874, John Sanderson, since deceased, entered into an article of agreement with Geo. Spahr by which he was to convey to the latter a certain lot of ground, designated by certain boundaries, lying in the vicinity of Bloomfield and supposed to contain about seven acres, for the consideration of \$150, per acre. An experienced surveyor ran the lines and reported the amount of land as nine acres and 100 perches. This report of the surveyor was accepted, the land paid for and the deed delivered. After the death of Sanderson it was discovered that the real amount of land was but seven acres and 138 perches, and the pliff. brought suit to recover back the money paid for the deficiency in the land. Having been an executed contract after delivery of the deed without any stipulations for the correction of errors, his Honor decided that in the legal aspect of the case there could be no recovery and directed judgment to be entered in favor of deft. M'Intire for pliff. Smiley for deft.
