OUR WASHINGTON LETTER.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 14, 1880. The House passed the Army appropriation bill, by a party vote. The Republicans, who at the extra session voted for what is called the "rider" on the bill, voted against it in a body yesterday. It is as follows :

"That no money appropriated in this act is appropriated or shall be paid for the subsistence, equipment, transportation, or compensation of any portion of the Army of the United States to be used as a police force to keep the peace at the polis of any election held in any State."

The Democrats profess to think Mr. Blaine's friends, outside of three or four states are "losing their grip," and that correspondingly, Grant's supporters are taking a firmer hold. But I take it this opinion arises from the fact that the Democrats want Grant nominated, because they think they can beat him at the polls. Republicans are aware of this Democratic belief, and it is very doubtful if, they dare nominate a man whom the Democrats endorse so heartily. On the Democratic side, in the South especially, Hancock comes to the front. The feeling for him in Louisiana, Texas, Virginia, and North Carolina is represented as very strong. Both Seymour and Tilden lose by the late semi-official announcements that they will decline to be candidates. To be sure, the denial has heretofore followed the aunouncement with great promptness, but I find a great many politicians here who believe Seymour will not be a candidate under any circumstances, and that Tilden is working simply to name the Democratic candidate.

The Senate has, as far as it had authority to do, approved the Ute agreement of Secretary Shurz. It has provided, however, that three-fourths of the adult Indians of the tribes must endorse the agreement before it shall go into effect. The manner of endorsement is not provided for, and I think it will puzzle the Indian Bureau to get an intelligible and reliable expression of opinion from the Indians.

Delegate Downey, of Wyoming introduced a bill in the House yesterday, providing for an appropriation of \$500,000 to commemorate in suitable paintings upon the wails of the National Capital, the birth, life and death of our Saviour, as told in the four Gospels.

Miscellaneous News Items.

Jas. Black, a negro, who attempted to outrage a white woman was lynched at Dinwiddie county, Va.

The house committee on elections has agreed to report that neither Donnelly nor Washburne is entitled to a seat.

A fire and explosion at Silvertown, Eng., resulted in the death of eleven persons and the injury of a number of others.

NEW ORLEANS, April 13 .- Charles E. Vienna, aged 11 years, while playing on a trapeze in the yard to day accidentally hung himself. When discovered he was dead.

Henry Garver and E. B. Woeheler, of Hope, Iud., were examining some bottles of corn medicine offered by a traveling corn doctor, when the bottles exploded, badly burning their faces and eyes. It is feared that their sight will be destroyed.

TRENTON, April 13 .- While a gang of men were engaged in raising a bridge in the new mill of the New Jersey steel and iron company this afternoon a beam fell, instantly killing Wm. A. Bendenfer and Lewis Powel, and slightly injuring a man named Warts and another man, name unknown.

Early on the morning of the 14th inst., two men, named Daniel Miller and Charles Frazer, were suffocated in a well near Bird-in-Hand. It appears that a blast had been set off, and one of the men went down before the gas had time to escape and was immediately overcome. His conrade went to his rescue and lost his life in the attempt. Both men were unmarried and about twenty five years of age.

Enoch Mosslander, a bachelor seventy-seven years old, living alone on a farm in western Virginia, three miles from Bellaire, O., was found on Wednesday burned to death in his house. A hole was burned in the floor, but by some means the fire had been extinguished. The theory of the neighbors is that robbers had tortured him to death while trying to get him to confess where his money was, Three years ago three masked robbers almost burned him to death for the same purpose, and it was generally believed that he had a large sum of money hidden in his house.

Seven Hundred Persons Buried Alive.

LONDON, April 12 .- A dispatch from Rangoon to the Daily News says : The following is an explanation of the massaeres at Mandalay. When a city is built in Burmah human sacrifices are offered up. A new monarch usually has a new capital. The evil spirits are irritated that there has been no change of capital, and the virtue of the old sacrifice, being gone, to appease them the astrologers declared it was necessary to offer up seven hundred lives. The sacrifices were made by the order of King

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
