

A Remarkable Case.

A strange case is reported in a letter from Vienna. Months ago two women returning from a visit to Bosnia, where their husbands are garrisoned, were murdered in a wood near Staab, in Hungary. The murderers were arrested and could not deny their crime, but they did not confess the motive, which is unknown to this day. One of the ruffians died in prison before the sentence was spoken. The other was sentenced to be hung. A week ago the execution took place, and as it was carried out in public great crowds, eager for something uncommon, even at the risk of being uncommonly horrible surrounded the scaffold. The murderer's name was Tabaks, and he belongs to the lowest class of the county population. When the cord was already round his neck he expressed his desire of addressing the public, and began saying with emphasis worthy of an orator, "I die willingly but my dear ladies and gentlemen,"—Here the executioner interposed and withdrew the trap door, so that Tabaks died in the act of speech, without knowing it, as it were, and without a struggle. The executioner had been most earnestly entreated by a doctor of medicine, a professor, to provide him for once with a "warm corpse." To comply with this wish he shortened the legal "eight minutes" for which a criminal should hang to three, and handed the corpse over to a physician, who declared Tabaks to entirely dead. The body was spread upon the marble table in the anatomy room and professor and students prepared for the dissection, which, had they been in anything of a hurry, might have become vivisection. All of a sudden the body moved, first its feet, and then its hands, and at last trembled violently all over. The professor did not lose his presence of mind, but calmly sent to the authorities to ask if Tabaks was to be restored to life, or executed again before he awoke! In the mean time he thought it his duty as a human being to do all he could to restore the life which had so unexpectedly shown itself. After an hour's hard rubbing and inhaling of salts, Tabaks was sufficiently recovered to understand that he had come to life this side of the Orcus, not the other side, as he at first believed. He swallowed a plateful of soup, and then fell a prey to violent fever, while his neck swelled in a most alarming manner. This was all we heard on the first day, besides vague information as to the authorities being uncertain whether the half-slain man should not be hanged over again more thoroughly. There was a universal outcry against this. It was said that Tabaks had atoned for his crime by suffering what the officers of the law had declared to be death. More cannot be exacted by the law. No man may be killed twice. The man's death, which took place exactly twenty-four hours after his execution, happily put an end to the controversy, and pity for the sufferer was the universal feeling. He had raved during a whole night, had suffered the most horrible spasms, and had so often attacked his nurses that it was found necessary to tie him to his bed. The probable consequence will be the removal of the executioner from his ugly office, which he had discharged with so little care.

A Kentucky Horror.

A special dispatch to the Louisville, Courier Journal from Clarksville, Ky., says: "Much excitement was caused yesterday by the lodgment in jail of Daniel Lyle, colored, his wife, and a negro woman named Susan Talley. Lyle and his wife have lately become monomaniacs upon religious subjects. He asserted that he was the Saviour, his wife the Virgin Mary and Susan Talley, who lives with them, a prophetess. In his zeal he has, on divers occasions, appeared at places of worship for both white and black people, and insisted on playing his part as preacher. Yesterday Constables Romily and Saunders procured a warrant for his arrest upon the charge of disturbing public worship, and went to his house to execute the same. Lyle resisted furiously, and assaulted Constable Saunders with an axe. Constable Romily fired three shots at Lyle, one of which took effect in his right breast and other two in the groin. Lyle then returned to his house and barricaded the windows and doors, but he surrendered when Sheriff Mosely appeared with an additional posse. Upon entering the house the officers smelled putrid flesh, and on making search found two of Lyle's children, aged respectively three and five years, dead, with their necks broken. The impression is that the murder was instigated by the two women, who have both yielded a strong influence over Lyle, and that he did the killing to relieve the women of the care of the children, believing that for the occasion he was Herod. Lyle's wounds are very painful, but are not considered mortal.

A strange disease has recently made its appearance in the family of Andrew Shaw, of Oxford, Ind., which resulted in the death of four of Mr. Shaw's children during the past three weeks. A swelling in the throat appears with a few hours' attendant sickness, and death ensues. The doctors say it is not diphtheria.
