Behrend's smoking policy may once again be coming under fire in the upcoming months.

After the April 3 introduction of the program, most smokers were extremely cooperative in smoking outdoors. However, now that an Erie winter is upon the campus, smokers have the cold weather to deal with.

Keith Houser, a freshman, sees the policy as relatively fair. "I don't see why professors shouldn't be allowed to smoke in their own offices, but I personally do not mind smoking outside." The deteriorating weather will "make it worse, but I still agree with the system. Other smokers generally agreed with Houser's

sentiments.

Shawn Foster, freshman, agrees that smoking should be limited, "But I wish there was place where we could smoke inside. When its raining or bitter cold, smoking seems to be less enjoyable."

Jack Buchanan also agrees with what he sees as a flawed system. "I am more than willing to respect the nonsmoker's rights, but I wish a nonsmoking section were established somewhere indoors. I (the policy) would still deter smoking, but could offer more flexibility to us smokers."

Chris Reber, the dean of student services, is pleased with how smoothly the policy is operating. "I think it has worked with minimal difficulty...the general understanding that the

purpose of the policy was to protect everyone from second hand smoke seems to have been very well received.

"The only unfortunate consequence is an inconvenience to smokers. They have been very considerate and cooperative and that is really why the system has worked so well."

The campus's nonsmokers seem very appreciative of the system. Joe Flaherty, a Behrend sophomore, is one of them. "I realize that smoking outside is an inconvenience, but it is so nice to not have to contend with ashtrays and cigarette butts. I do sympathize with the smokers who are out in the rain and snow... there should be some indoor area for them."

## Lion Ambassadors: promoting Penn State pride

Behrend's Lion Ambassadors are a dedicated group of students committed to the promotion of Penn State pride.

Claiming that Penn State should be a lifetime experience, they work hard to share their spirit and pride with present students and to keep in touch with alumni. They, as "Penn State Student Alumni Corps," represent the college at special events. They act as tour guides, escorts, and hosts for new students or returning alumni.
