## Men's Basketball Lions drop two more games on the road, record falls to 7-14

Problems continued last week for the men's cagers when they lost two away games at the hands of Geneva College and St. John Fisher College.

Last Saturday. the Lions were dominated by Geneva, The Golden 86-63. Tornadocs finished with four scorers in double figures. According to Head Coach Doug Zimmerman, the Lions were overmatched.

'Geneva is a better team than we are," said the seventh-year mentor of the men's squad.

Geneva led throughout most of the game and owned a 44-24 halftime lead. The loss put Behrend at a disappointing 7-14 mark for the year. Geneva improved its record to 16-7.

Behrend scorers were led by senior guard Dave Gurska with 21 points. Gurska shot five for six from behind the three point arc. Shooting guard Jeff Cowan made three out of nine from the three point area to add 11 points for the Lions.

Six foot-five forward Rick Demski helped play inside by putting in 17 points. Seven of Demski's points were from the free throw line.

Freshman center Steve Cooper and Demski each had seven rebounds to lead Behrend on the boards.

The Lions made 22 of 62 shots from the field for 36

The Golden percent. Tornadocs shot 37 of 69 for 54 percent.

Geneva owned the rebounding edge over Behrend by a 39-26 margin.

Tim Dilworth led Geneva with 20 points. The Golden Tornadoes' Steve Stokrp scored 12 points in the first

half and finished with 18 markers. Todd Dean had 15 points and Tim Bender added 11 buckets for Geneva.

On Thursday, Behrend headed into the state of New York to play St. John Fisher. The Cardinals defeated the

Lions, 90-83.

Zimmerman commented, "St. John Fisher shot outstanding in the first half, but we still played well."

St. John Fisher shot an incredible 61 percent from the floor, with Behrend shooting a respectable 49 percent from the field. The Cardinals canned nine of 16 from three point land while the Lions made only seven of 26 three pointers.

The Lions outrebounded the Cardinals 27-25.

The Lions were led by Demski in the scoring department with 19 points. Demski also ripped down cight boards to lead Behrend. Junior point guard Randy Baughman made three out of four shots behind the three point arc and added 18 points. Baughman also had ninc assists to lead the Lions.

Cooper had 14 buckets to aid Behrend. Cowan made

two treys and had 10 points for the Lions.

Gurska, Behrend's, all-time three point shooting leader, made only two out of thirteen attempts from behind the arc.

Six foot-six senior Kevin Friedel led three 20-point Cardinals' scorers with 22 markers. Mark Adams hit five three pointers and ended with 20 points, while Wakili Moore hit two treys to compile 20 points. Kevin Schultz added 13 buckets for St. John Fisher.

The Cardinals took a 56-37 lead into the locker room.

The win put St. John Fisher's record at 10-8.

Behrend travels to upstate New York to play Alfred University today. The Lions are hosting Keuka College this Saturday night at 7:30 for their final home game of the season. Behrend's closes the season at Kcuka on February 22

NOTES: On the year, Behrend is shooting 45 percent from the field and 75 percent from the charity stripe....The Lions are averaging 79 points a game while giving up 83 points a contest....Demski and Gurska cach have 296 points to lead the Lions in scoring....Behrend has, 690 rebounds for the season. Demski leads the Lions in rebounding with 157 boards, averaging eight per game.... Baughman leads the team in assists with 133 dishes. averaging over six a game.
