To be considered a diversity course, a class must study one of the following topics: race, religion, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, and/or global

"Diversity focused" courses will concentrate on one or more of the above topics specifically. A possible example of a diversity focused course would be "Women's role in the Business World for the 90's."

"Diversity enhanced" courses would commit at least a fourth of their class time to fulfill the diversity requirement. A theoretical example of this would be a history class for humanities

which might focus on the establishment of Israel and their ensuing problems.

Students can meet these requirements by taking selected courses in their major field, elective courses and General Elective courses. The report adds learning experiences, like studies abroad, certain internships, Peace Corps experiences may be accepted in place of classes, provided a Faculty Senate subcommittee approves the measure.

Senate members and committees will spent the next year ironing out details of the approved diversity requirement. Classes must go through an approval process before being designated "diversity focused" or "diversity enhanced" courses.


