Student charged with DUI, Niagara evacuated again

Campus police charged a resident student with Driving Under the Influence, reckless driving, and underage consumption of alcohol after he was stopped for traffic violations early Friday morning.

According to a report issued by Randy Hoffman, Manager of Police and Safety, the defendant refused to submit to blood-alcohol testing, and his license will be suspended.

False alarm in Niagara

Niagara Hall residents were evacuated Monday afternoon, April 16, by officers responding to a fire alarm on the first floor. Officers determined that the alarm had been triggered by fumes from

a potpourri burner. The building was reopened within approximately 30 minutes.

In a related case, resident assistants reported that fire alarms on the east wing of Niagara Hall failed to operate during the emergency. Subsequent investigation led to the discovery that the fire alarm bell on the second floor had been removed and cut wires had deactivated alarms throughout the east wing.

Hoffman's report indicated that the last known operation of the alarms was March 29. Anyone with information is asked to contact the department at Extension #6101.

Car damages

A resident student reported that his vehicle was damaged while it was parked in the

Niagara Staff Lot early Monday morning, April 16. Damage is estimated at \$40. No further information was available.

Harassment, disorderly conduct

Police charged a resident student for disorderly conduct and harassment early Sunday morning after officers observed him kneeling on the walkway between Perry and Niagara Halls. According to Hoffman's report, the subject was yelling at people as they passed. He refused to quiet down and began shouting obscenities at the officer. The suspect was released to a friend after he was charged.

Hoffman reported that a set of keys was found on campus and delivered to the Police and Safety Office in South Cottage.

Faculty and Staff Campaign raises \$15,000 for campus projects

Plan allows for choice of payment and its use

Each year members of Behrend's faculty and staff are given a request to contribute to the Faculty and Staff Campaign.

Over one third of Behrend's faculty and staff this year responded with a donation.

The campaign raised over \$15,000 to benefit Behrend.

Staff members who were interested were given an opportunity to contribute in three ways: through a direct donation, through a set amount to be taken out of his or her's next paycheck, or through a sum to be taken out of his or her pay for a definite or indefinite number of pay periods.

The donations were completely voluntary, and money given at Behrend stays at Behrend. It does not go to

University Park.

Faculty and Staff were also permitted to designate where they wanted their money to go.

Lynn Weber, associate director of Development and University Relations, sees this as an advantage to the campaign.

"They would give knowing their money would be going to support their particular pet project," she stated.

Weber also expressed feelings that the support of the faculty and staff of the college helps to attract the support of others.

"We go to the community to ask for money also. To be able to say to the community, 'The faculty and staff support Behrend' is a nice thing," said Weber.

A celebration was held by the college on April 12 to show appreciation for the contributions made to the campaign by the

faculty and staff.

"We were very happy and pleased with the number of faculty and staff that gave," stated Weber.

She hopes that students receive a positive message from the results of the campaign.

"Sixteen percent of the faculty gave last year and this year it was thirty five percent, or one third of the faculty. I think you guys should be real proud of the fact that your faculty care enough about you and the college to want to support you and to give out of their own pocket for programs so that your education will be better," Weber stated.

Weber feels the campaign greatly benefits the students. "The student is the bottom line. They are the ones that are gaining."

Recycling program soon to begin at Behrend

Glitches in marketing, education to be worked out

If the 1980s were the years of nuclear concern then the 1990s will most likely be the decade characterized by environmental awareness.

In popular press polls nationwide, the environment has ranked second to the deficit in priorities of U.S. citizens.

Corporations, educational institutions and local governments have recognized this trend and started recycling programs.

As of July 1, 1990, Behrend

will join this list and begin a program to recycle aluminum, and high grade paper as well as colored and clear glass.

The plan

Three ten gallon containers (one each for paper, aluminum, and glass) will be placed in classrooms for users to dispose their recyclables, according to the plan.

Workers will then remove the recyclables to a designated central area.

Each floor of the residence halls will have three twenty

gallon containers for residents to deposit their materials.

Housing workers will be responsible for transporting the materials to the central storage area.

Each apartment will receive three plastic stackable containers for the same purpose of separating recyclables.

However, residents will be responsible for transporting the materials from their apartments to the designated area.
