

## Hahn says ground war may be costly

While the first days of the war have been relatively smooth, the honeymoon may be over for U.S. forces and their allies and officials at home if and when a ground war develops, according to Dr. Peter Hahn, associate professor of history at Behrend and noted Middle East expert.

## Anderson predicts Hussein's fate

"We will give him to the Saudis. They will have a trial... and they will lop Saddam's head off."

That prediction by Jack Anderson, a Pulitzer Prizewinning journalist and nationally syndicated columnist, was made to a near-capacity audience in Erie Hall Tuesday night as he addressed the war in the Gulf.

Known for his columns that reveal government secrets and news-making information, Anderson spoke on "The News Behind The News."

Based on reliable sources in Saudi Arabia, Anderson said the United States "does not want to kill Saddam Hussein
