For many Americans, filing annual income tax returns can be a frustrating process. Help is available, however, for taxpayers who need assistance completing the complex tax forms.

Approximately 25 accounting students from Behrend are volunteering their services through the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program, a nation-wide system which last year aided more than one million

taxpayers.

"We want people to come out and get help," explained James Voss, instructor of accounting at Behrend. "Our student volunteers are anxious to provide assistance."

Voss, who spearheads the Behrend group of VITA, believes the program provides a valuable service to the Erie community. "We are offering a free service that any taxpayer can take advantage of," Voss said.

"Our students have taken numerous courses in tax and accounting and have had specific training before entering the VITA program," he continued. Students staff sites throughout the Erie area, answering questions about tax returns and completing necessary tax forms.

Locations include the Conrad House, the Wesleyville Borough office, the Booker T. Washington Center, the Lawrence Park Township building, and several branches of the Erie Library System.

These sites, which are stocked with various IRS tax forms, will continue to operate through April 15.

Even when the alcoholic has stopped drinking, families often remain dysfunctional and codependent for several generations, Smith teaches. Having treated more than 10,000 co-dependents, Caron Family Services' five-day program serves as a model for treatment programs evolving across the country.

Smith is the author of "Treatment Issues for Addicted Adult Children from Alcoholic Families," "Grandchildren of Alcoholics: Another Generation of Co-Dependency," and is currently working on a new book which deals with perfectionism. Smith has given interviews for ABC's "Nightline" NBC's "1986", "US Magazine", and has been the featured presenter at numerous regional and national conferences.

Smith will be the featured

speaker for Penn State-Behrend's "Drug Awareness Week" which begins on Feb. 25. Other highlights include guitarist Marty O'Conner, Julie Marrow demonstrating therapeutic touch, Marie Spaeder exploring "Drawing on the Right Side of the Brain," and much more. All speaker series and cultural events at the College are free and open to the public.
