- IP Request applications, financial aid and program information from likely institutions
- Write application essay
- IP Register for applicable financial aid programs/
- CP Obtain letters of recomendation from faculty or professionals in the field where you have worked

Senior year. Spring

- IP Call all institutions to make sure they have your completed application materials
- IP Send deposit to the institution of your choice
- IP Notify other colleges and universities of your decision so they can admit students on their waiting lists

Send thank you notes to reference writers, informing them of your plans
