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The business of quality can help the quality of business, says Salvia, if the consumer shops around for the right product at the right price.

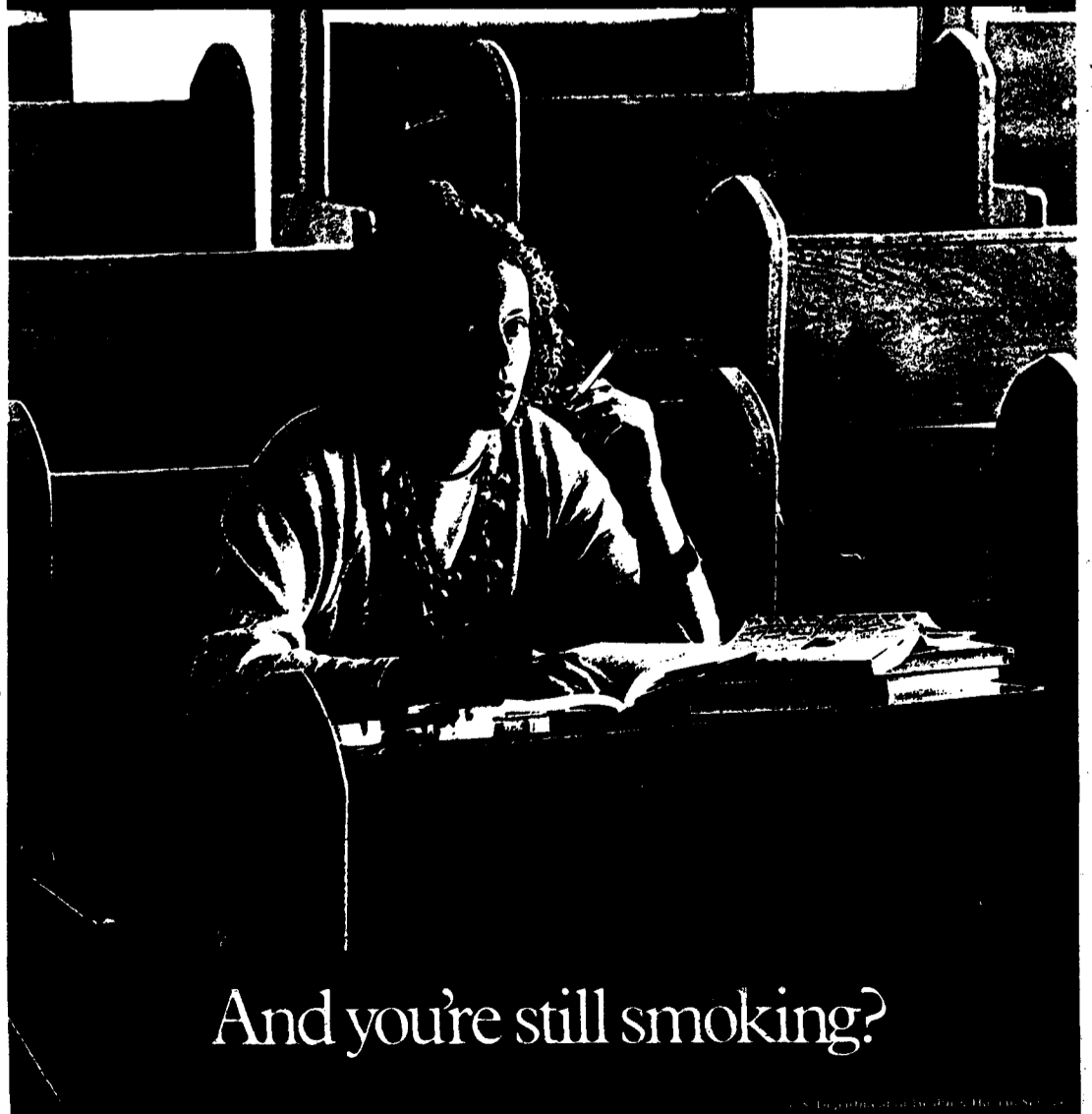
In deciding which "quality philosophy" you should choose, Salvia suggests, "Why not listen to as many different viewpoints as we can, then pick out those things that seem most relevant
