New bill could change crime reporting campus

(Continued from page 1) administrators, but if you dig you can find inaccuracies."

How does Behrend fare in the crime analysis? The number of assaults and motor vehicle thefts did not change in the last year, while burglaries and larcenies declined. There has been no murder, manslaughter, rape, arson or robberies reported in the last two years.

The total number of part one offenses (crime which includes assaults, burglaries, larceny, and motor vehicle thefts) declined from 86 reported offenses in 1989 to 55 offenses in 1990.

However, in looking at the crime reported in Lawrence Park, there is an increase in the total number of part one offenses from students to be fully informed 57 reported in 1989 to 73 of crime on their campus. reported in 1990.

The public reporting of crime on campus will allow students more information to make wiser choices. If this system goes into effect, names and addresses of students involved in criminal activity on campus will be released to the general public, allowing
