The Venda-Card saves students approximately five cents a copy and according to Bailey the card pays for itself after about fifty copies.

Nevertheless, students can't understand why they are expected to pay five cents more on campus for the same service provided in the community at a lower rate.

"I think it's very high, but everything on campus is fifty percent higher than average," commented Doug Cummings, a sixth semester plastics major.

"I make copies in there once a week and end up spending close to three dollars each time. It adds up. Students should get a discount and copies should only be ten cents because it evenly divides into a dollar," added seventh semester history major Chris Dyne.

Bailey also said that staff and clubs don't have to pay as much for copies. "It's because they are an academic unit and because they do research, we have a different set-up for them."

Though Bailey said he knows why students are upset about the prices, he doesn't see any price breaks in the future. "There are no funds available to provide a free service."

Gun Incident

"It's unfortunate the Water Bureau is not using these methods to remove the quagga mussels," Masteller said. "This would be an ideal way to control them."

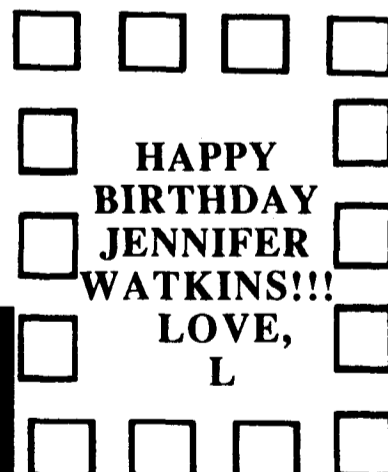
In the future it would be beneficial if one of these methods was implemented in the use of controlling the quagga mussels.

The colder environment of Lake Erie might supply a natural controller to the quagga problem.

"Their shells are much thinner and more brittle than those of the zebra mussel," said Masteller. "The quagga may not be able to take the battering of ice and storm activity."

Researchers are continuing to study the effect the quagga mussels will have on Lake Erie.

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
