University President Joab Thomas, in an article published in the November 23 issue of The Daily Collegian, predicted some very painful University wide budget cuts. Thomas made it clear that downsizing, not expansion is the University's new goal.

It's just a matter of time before the University's Future Committee releases recommendations for further cuts in the system and those "recommendations" could affect each and every student at Behrend.

An audited financial report submitted to the board last week states the University is worth 2.8 billion dollars (before depreciation).

Let's use these assets to fulfill our mission: to educate. Sure we need buildings, but we can make do with what we have in order to prepare our minds for the future we will

inevitably face. Here's our recommendation: less building, less research, more teaching and more learning.
