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## ZBT's hike to Pittsburgh Walk will benefit American Cancer Society

Thirty-three brothers of Zeta Beta Tau fraternity will be making their third annual "Walk to Pittsburgh" from April 23-25.

The walk will benefit the Erie Unit of the American Cancer Society. The students aim to raise \$3000, all to be spent locally on patient services, including transportation to treatment centers, equipment loans, and financial assistance for medications.

"Walk to Pittsburgh" will begin at 3 p.m. Friday, April 23 with a ceremony hosted by Provost and Dean Dr. John M. Lilley on the first floor of the Reed Building. Guest speakers include American Cancer Society representatives and Zeta Beta Tau President Jody Wingard.

Zeta Beta Tau members and alumni will walk west along East 38th Street, and south along Route 19 to Pittsburgh.

Walkers will rotate at 16 mile intervals over the three day trip to allow adequate rest. According to Vice President D.J. Wolbert, an eighth semester electrical

engineering major, they may stop to rest halfway there, and everybody walks the last leg. They will be returning to Erie April 25, and there will be two vehicles with each walking group.

The walk is scheduled to end at about 11:30 a.m. Sunday, April 25, at Three Rivers Stadium. Later that afternoon they will be recognized for their efforts during the Pittsburgh Pirates-Houston Astros baseball game. The game is complimentary of the Pirates.

"It's a worthwhile endeavor to raise money for the American Cancer Association," said Wolbert. "I'm looking forward to it very much. It's a good time getting together and trying to make the most of it."

plaque dedication following the ceremony, which will be held between the upper and lower Reed Building parking lots.

Health and Wellness Coordinator, will read a proclamation written by Pennsylvania Governor Robert Casey declaring National Organ and Tissue Donor Awareness Week.

These events are funded by a grant from the Elfun Society, a volunteer organization of General Electric leaders.

Clean-up groups were organized as part of the grant, and students who take part will be asked to contribute at least one
