

Our teaders will recollect that in 1843 Mr. Legare, then Attorney General of the United States during the Administration of Mr. Tyler, visited Boston in company with the President and the members of the Cabinet, in order to take part in the anniversary of the battle of Bunker Hill On the morning of the anniversary he was attleked by disease, which speedily terminated his existence. The city authorities of Boston proposed to creet a monument in honor of Mr. Legare, but the Secretary of the Treasury. Mr. Spencer, considered it was the especial duty of Congress to do so in the Congressional burying ground.
