FOR the benefit of Mr. F. H. Thomas, Supt. of the B. C. R. R., and Mr. Bartruff, Manager of the Bellefonte Lecture Course, we wish to enlighten the holders of the Course tickets in regard to the recent action of the B. C. R. R. When selling tickets for the course, Mr. Bartruff stated that a twenty-five cent rate could be secured on the railroad provided one hundred Course tickets were sold.
