Opening of College.

The Winter term opened on Wednesday morning, Jan. 4th, at eleven o'clock with Chapel in the Auditorium. The attendance of students was very slim, but the Faculty showed up in goodly numbers. The heavy fall of snow had greatly blocked travel on the railroads and consequently delayed the arrivals. Quite a number of the students came straggling in on Thursday.

Dr. Atherton congratulated the student body on the magnificent progress of the past year and expressed the hope that the year to come would be still more prosperous. He communicated the welcome intelligence that the College had received combined Christmas and New Year's gifts from good friends, and named Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Carnegie as the benefactors in this case. It is expected that the Board of Trustees at their meeting in Harrisburg on the 24th of this month will complete the arrangements for the administration of these funds.
